
In accordance with the motto, "Enhancing Community Livability," your City government is committed to the seven aspects of *The Corvallis 2020 Vision Statement*.

The City of Corvallis is governed by the Council/Manager form of government in accordance with the Home Rule Charter adopted by voters in 1949 and updated in 1995.

The nine-member City Council is elected by geographical ward to serve a two-year term as the governing body for Corvallis. The Mayor presides at Council meetings and is elected at-large for a four-year term. The Mayor and Council provide community leadership, develop policies to guide the City in delivering services and achieving community goals, and encourage citizen awareness and involvement.

The Mayor and City Council are assisted by many advisory boards and commissions. Members are volunteers who devote countless hours to community activities in their areas of expertise. Members usually are appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. Residents who would like more information or are interested in serving on a board or commission, should call the Mayor's Office at 766-6985 or stop by City Hall at 501 SW Madison Avenue.

Every effort is made to keep citizens well-informed and involved. In addition to the information provided in this guide, a member of the City Council or, alternatively, a Benton County Commissioner is available at the Public Library on most Saturdays from 10:00 am to 12 noon on non-holiday weekends to discuss citizen concerns.

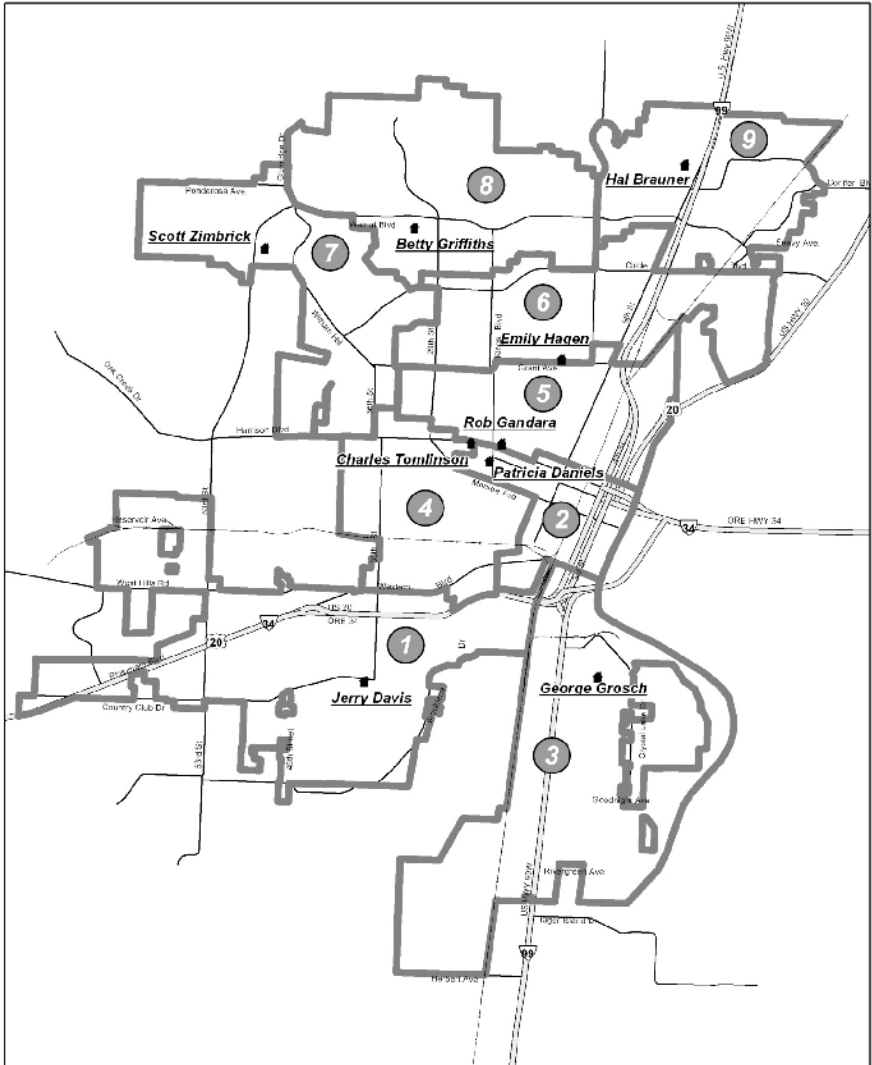

The City Manager's Office, located at 501 SW Madison Avenue, provides leadership, coordination, and management for the affairs of the City. The City Manager's Office is responsible for implementing Council directives, providing public information, preparing and maintaining the City's official records, and overseeing the City's election process.

Contained within the City Manager's Office, this division provides general support services to City staff to maintain a productive workforce. The Finance Department also includes the Utility Billing Division which is responsible for establishing water/sewer services and monthly bills, the City's Information Systems division, and the Municipal Court.

**Parks and Recreation: 766-6918**

The Parks and Recreation Department provides a wide range of community services related to parks and recreation. This includes maintenance of parks, beautification areas, and open space; stewardship and care of downtown street trees, park buildings, a public skate park, Osborn Aquatic Center, and other sports facilities. It offers a variety of leisure learning classes, sports programs, special events, and age-specific special programs for youth, teens, adults, and older adults (see Chintimini Senior Center). The Department also participates in numerous collaborative efforts with other community partners. ## seniors

**Chintimini Senior Center: 766-6959**

## aquatics

**Osborn Aquatic Center: 766-SWIM (7946)**

Renovated and expanded in 2000, Osborn Aquatic Center boasts the largest water surface of any public swimming facility in Oregon. Indoors, open year-round, you'll find a 50-meter Olympic-size pool and a therapy pool. Outside during the summer months is Otter Beach, which includes a six-lane lap pool and a water experience you won't soon forget: Interactive water cannons, spray nozzles, and water geysers are combined with a moving water channel and several slides, including a 160-foot twisting water slide. ## police

**Police Department: 766-6924**

The Police Department, utilizing community policing techniques, provides a full range of professional services, including uniformed patrol, criminal investigations, traffic safety, crime prevention, animal control, parking enforcement, and 911 emergency communication. The Department also participates in community outreach and safety education programs such as Neighborhood Watch and Safety Town, and maintains an active and growing volunteer program including police cadet and auxiliary police programs. The Police Department is located at 180 NW Fifth Street and office hours are 8 am to 5 pm, Tuesday through Friday.

## fire

**Fire Department: 766-6961**

The Fire Department is responsible not only for responding to fire and medical emergencies, but also for resolving hazardous materials emergencies, regulating open burning, enforcing weed abatement and vegetation trimming along public rights-of-way, and providing programs designed to teach the public to react appropriately to fire and medical emergencies. The Fire Department manages the FireMed ambulance membership program. This program allows residents to pay an annual fee which helps to cover the cost of ambulance medical care and transportation services.

## court

**Municipal Court: 766-6948**

The Municipal Court is located on the corner of Sixth and Madison at 560 SW Madison Avenue. Court times are Mondays at 3 pm; Wednesdays at 8:30 am; and Thursdays at 8:30 am and 3 pm. Cases handled in Municipal Court include parking tickets, traffic citations issued by City police officers, shoplifting, and minor criminal offenses. Office hours are 8 am–noon and 1–5 pm, Monday through Friday.

## Transportation, Traffic, and Streets

### transit

#### **Corvallis Transit System (CTS): 766-6998**

Corvallis has a transit system servicing all areas of the city. Buses run Monday-Saturday. For specific bus routes and schedules, pick up a free map at Albright & Raw, Rite Aid, WinCo, City Hall, the OSU Bookstore, MU Business Office, OSU Valley Library, OSU Parking Services, Corvallis-Benton County Public Library, Chintimini Senior Center, and on the Transit System buses. Transit service between Corvallis and Philomath is available through the Philomath Connection (766-6998).

#### **Paratransit Services: 766-6916**

Paratransit service is available to disabled persons who are unable to use the regular bus service.

#### **Linn-Benton Loop: 917-7667**

The Linn-Benton Loop System—provided in cooperation with the City of Albany, Hewlett-Packard, Benton County, and Linn-Benton Community College (LBCC)—operates Monday through Friday between Albany, Corvallis, LBCC, Oregon State University, and Hewlett-Packard.

### transportation

#### **Transportation Division: 766-6916**

#### **Municipal Airport**

The Corvallis Municipal Airport and Industrial Park is located approximately five miles south of the city's downtown area on Highway 99W. The airport is a general aviation airport with a fixed-base operator and accommodates private, rental, and corporate aircraft services. The Airport Industrial Park is comprised of approximately 175 acres, with a wide range of industrial sites available for lease.

## **Bike Lanes and Paths**

Named a “Bicycle-Friendly City,” Corvallis claims one of the best bicycling systems in the nation with approximately 134 miles of bike lanes/multi-use paths stretching throughout the city. A free map of Corvallis and Benton County bikeways is available at City Hall (main floor), the Benton County Courthouse, Corvallis-Benton County Public Library, and local bike shops.

## **Street Sweeping and Fall Leaf Collection Program**

The City sweeps most streets at least once per month. During the Fall Leaf Collection Program (from November through early January), leaf piles are picked up once per week and the streets are swept the following day. The street sweeping schedule and Fall Leaf Collection guidelines are published in *the City* newsletter and on the City’s Web site.

# Utilities

## Water Treatment

Corvallis operates two water treatment plants that provide drinking water to residents and businesses. The City conducts over 10,000 tests on drinking water every year to ensure a high-quality product and compliance with all State and federal regulations. Public Works publishes a water quality report each year detailing the numerous tests done on the water supply. You can obtain a copy by calling Public Works at 766-6916, by visiting the Web page, or by looking in the March issue of *the City* newsletter. Any questions or concerns about drinking water quality can be directed to the Taylor Water Treatment Plant, 766-6932.

## Water Service

Public Works maintains over 230 miles of water distribution pipes, 1,900 fire hydrants, and 14,000 water meters. Preventive maintenance programs, such as leak detection and flushing, ensure an uninterrupted supply of high-quality water to all customers. Meters are typically located in the sidewalk in front of your residence. A meter reader gathers consumption information once per month, which is used to develop your monthly utility bill. Problems or concerns about water pressure or the water meter can be directed to Public Works, 766-6916. The Public Works Department urges all residents to use water wisely to help assure an adequate supply of water for the future.

## Water Utility Billing: 766-6949

The Water Utility Billing Division is located on the lower level in City Hall at 501 SW Madison Avenue. Staff are available to answer questions regarding water bills Monday–Friday, 8 am to 5 pm. Payments may be mailed, paid via electronic bank draft, or deposited in drop boxes located at City Hall, the OSU Bookstore, Albright & Raw Drugs, Rite Aid, Rice’s Pharmacy, Law Enforcement Building, Hewlett-Packard, or the Chintimini Senior Center. Call 766-6949 for information about setting up electronic bank drafting.

## Wastewater Treatment

Corvallis operates a wastewater treatment plant and maintains over 200 miles of wastewater collection pipes to treat about four billion gallons of wastewater per year. Preventive maintenance programs, such as smoke testing and video inspection, ensure that pipelines are able to handle the wastewater flows and won't cause backups into service lines. The wastewater goes through a rigorous series of tests in the treatment process to assure high-quality water is discharged back to the Willamette River to protect the environment. Combined sewer overflow facilities provide additional environmental protection by capturing and treating excessive flows from heavy rain events.

## Storm Water

Corvallis' storm water system is a combination of 14 miles of urban streams and over 150 miles of collection pipes. The urban stream system not only helps to prevent localized flooding, but also provides an open, natural space throughout the community. Please do not disturb the vegetation or dump garbage or debris in the drainage-ways. This can cause flooding by blocking the flow. Also, you can help maintain the water quality by keeping pet waste, lawn chemicals, and oil out of urban streams.

## disposal

### **Corvallis Disposal and Recycling Company: 754-0444**

Corvallis has a franchise agreement with Corvallis Disposal and Recycling Company to provide garbage pickup, recycling collection, and annual leaf collection. Weekly residential garbage pickup and recycling schedules differ according to geographical area.

Corvallis residents recycle over 13 materials through the curbside program or at two drop sites in the city. Contact Corvallis Disposal to obtain containers for household recyclables and instructions on proper recycling procedures for common recyclables, as well as household hazardous wastes.

Help keep our city safe and healthy—do not put hazardous waste materials such as pesticides or herbicides in a dumpster, or pour them on the ground or into a drain or storm sewer.

#### **Volunteer Opportunities: 766-6901**

Corvallis thrives on an active volunteer program to maintain the high quality of life that so characterizes the City. Opportunities abound to contribute time and effort on City projects, advisory boards, commissions, or task forces.

### outreach

#### **Public Outreach: 766-6901**

Each year, Corvallis seeks to assess the priorities and satisfaction of Corvallis residents through the Citizen Attitude Survey. This questionnaire, designed to help the City Council and the Budget Commission determine how best to allocate City resources and deliver City services, provides an opportunity for Corvallis citizens to actively participate in the decision-making process.

#### **Citizen Involvement (Land Use): 766-6908**

The Corvallis Committee for Citizen Involvement (CCI) is a volunteer citizen advisory committee with a mandate to facilitate citizen involvement in the City's land-use planning and decision making. The CCI undertakes activities that increase the amount and quality of participation in the City's existing land-use procedures. 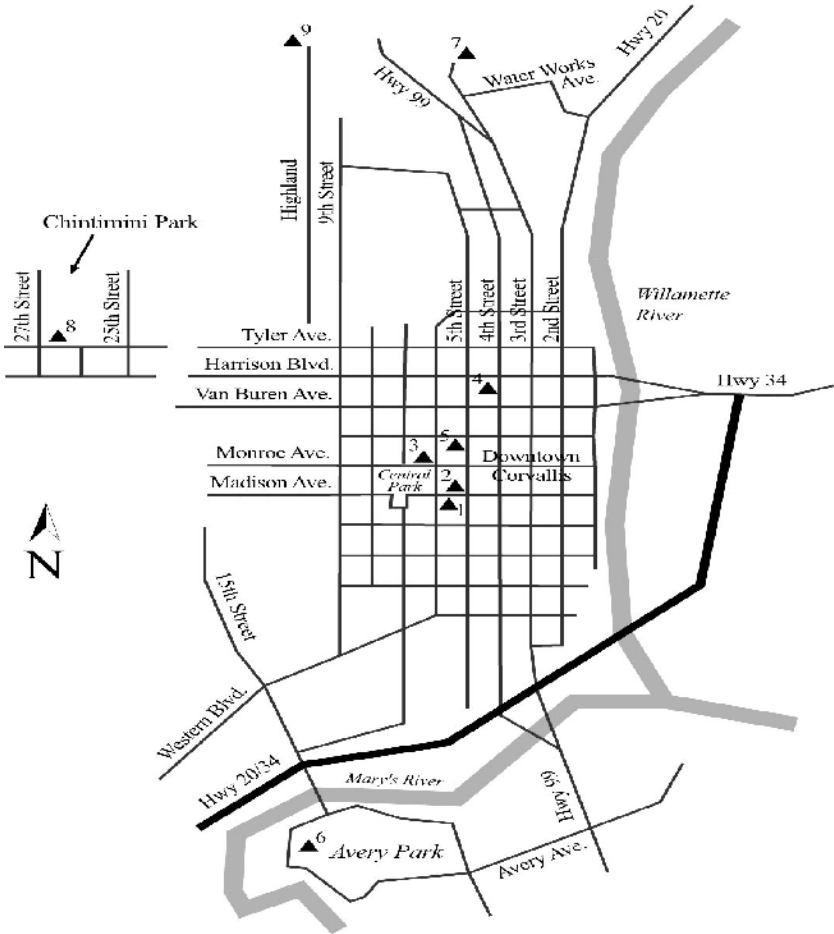
